2025 PSATS Conference

This past April I attended the Annual Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors (PSATS) Conference in Hershey with the township manager, Dave Blocher, township finance director/treasurer, Camie Stouck-Phiel, township secretary, Michele Long, and township road superintendent, Chris Walter. The conference brought municipal officials from across the commonwealth together in one location. The 2025 conference hosted more than 4,000 township officials. Over the four-day period over 100 municipal workshops where given. The workshops ranged from administration, public works, public safety, planning and zoning, and many more. In addition to the daily workshops, a general session was held daily for all attendees. The general session featured keynote speakers, state representatives, and state senators. These sessions created a great opportunity to gain inspiration from the speakers and to ask questions to those that work in Harrisburg at the state level of government. In addition to the workshops and general sessions, nearly 300 exhibitors shared their products and services daily with all attendees. It made for easy face-to-face meetings with many of the companies and businesses that aid in running good municipal government, including many partners of Cumberland Township.

Each year at the PSATS conference, municipal organizations are asked to put together prize baskets that represent the businesses and industries they live in. These prize baskets are randomly given away to participants at the conference as a way of promoting what different areas have to offer. For the past two years I have been able to put together a fabulous basket with the help of local business, through the Adams County Association of Township Organizations! The 2025 basket consisted of overnight stays at Best Western Gettysburg and Quality Inn Gettysburg, a private Adams County Winery wine tour, a Barn Resort gift card, a Dobbin House gift card, a Mason Dixon Distillery gift card and canned cocktails, a Mr. G's gift card, a Mister Eds fudge sample box, Gettysburg Bus Tour tickets, Ghostly Image tickets and a gift card to Lincoln Links. From the Manager's Desk...

As America prepares to celebrate its 250th Anniversary in 2026, Cumberland Township will also be celebrating a milestone of its own, its 275th Anniversary. Historians and records indicate that Thomas Hossack was appointed as the first Cumberland Township Tax Collector on December 5,1749. The renovation of the original building, built in 1979, with a small Police Department expansion in 1994, has served residents for over four decades. This renovation, when completed,

will serve for decades to come.

Cumberland Township is an ideal location that surrounds the Gettysburg Borough on three sides. In addition, for those that may not know, almost one-fifth of Cumberland Township, or 3,785 acres, is comprised of the National Park Service where the Battle of Gettysburg primarily took place. Cumberland Township was also home to the former Five Star General and 34th President of the United States Dwight David Eisenhower and his family. Today Cumberland Township has approximately 2,400 housing units with a population exceeding 7,000 residents that call Cumberland Township home.

This project was made possible by \$2 million in grant funds from the Pennsylvania Office of the Budget's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program, and \$100,000 in grant funds from the Commonwealth Financing Authority's Statewide Local Share Account. These funds were received due to the tireless efforts of our local elected officials, Sen. Doug Mastriano and Rep. Dan Moul, who advocated for the project on Cumberland Township's behalf. We are incredibly thankful for their continued support of our township and our residents.



The site was officially turned over to ECI Construction April 1, 2025, with the demolition work starting that week. Two months into the project, much of the demolition work has been completed. The site work started in May for the small areas of additional space that include the new police patrol room, break room, and carport for police and township vehicles. The projected completion date of the renovation work is projected for the end of March 2026. The township will then take a 30-to-60-day systematic process of moving back into the building, while continuing to serve the residents of the township with as minimal impact as possible.

American Battlefield Trust's approval to operate from the former Gettysburg Country Club building has provided an extreme cost savings during the renovation period. Moving from 1370 Fairfield Road to our temporary location at 730 Chambersburg Road brought challenges to normal operations. The staff and elected officials have been tremendously helpful in exploring options and finding solutions to make sure the township continues to operate efficiently.

Thank you to everyone and our neighbors, for helping and working with the township during this exciting time.

Preserve our Heritage - Provide Quality Services - Plan for our Future

From your Maintenance Department...

This summer the Cumberland Township Maintenance Crew has a busy schedule on the books with both contracted and in-house projects.

We will start the project season off with a surface treatment to Old Mill Road and Country Club Lane. We will be applying a Cape Seal which is a two-part process utilizing seal coating and a micro-surface finish. In addition, we will be seal coating and fog sealing the following roads; Red Rock, Blackhorse Tavern, Plank, and Willoughby Run. Prior to the seal coat we will be re-grading the shoulders on these roads which allows water to run to the side ditches and flow more efficiently off the road surface.





A section of Herrs Ridge Road from Chambersburg Road to Old Mill Road has been prepped with new stormwater pipes and base repair and will be resurfaced with warm mix asphalt and a fiber additive. This will look like a conventional paving project. The fiber is added at the asphalt plant which will help strengthen the material and help prevent stress and fatigue from high traffic volumes.



In addition to these projects, we will be preparing for future projects in various areas of the Township. These include replacing and upgrading storm sewer piping and base repairs in areas that may have been damaged from winter weather or excessive heavy traffic. Upgrading various traffic signs is also on the list for the summer/fall projects. This is being done to help upgrade reflectivity and allow the motoring public to navigate around our roadways.

We will also continue to map our stormwater infrastructure, this process allows us to track our inventory and create a maintenance schedule for cleaning, replacements, and upgrades. You may see the guys traversing throughout your development locating, inspecting, and documenting the infrastructure system with GIS survey equipment.

Roadside mowing is a big part of our summer maintenance work. Mowing not only makes the roads look nice but also improves visibility along the roads and intersections and helps keep vegetation from encroaching on the facilities within the right-of-way. As you encounter our mowing crew, please use caution and give the operator enough space to work safely before navigating around the equipment.

These summer projects are completed with help from our Maintenance Staff along with our multimunicipal group which includes Gettysburg Borough, Mount Pleasant, Straban and Franklin Townships.

Stormwater vs. Sanitary Sewer: What's the Difference?


At first glance, it might seem like all the water that leaves our streets, sinks, and tubs ends up in the same place. But in reality, most communities—including ours—have two very different systems working together below ground: the stormwater system and the sanitary sewer system.

Understanding the difference between them can help prevent backups, pollution, and costly damage

—especially during heavy rain events.

The sanitary sewer system is designed to carry wastewater away from homes, schools, and businesses. This includes everything that goes down your drains, toilets, washing machines, and dishwashers. The water travels through a network of underground pipes to the township's treatment facility, where it is cleaned and safely discharged back into the environment.

Because this system handles waste, it is carefully monitored and regulated. It's not meant to handle large volumes of rainwater, when it does, the system can become overwhelmed, leading to sewer backups into homes or overflows into local waterways.



The stormwater system, on the other hand, is built to manage rain and snowmelt. Water flows off rooftops, roads, and sidewalks into storm drains, which lead directly to streams, creeks, or other natural bodies of water—without treatment. That's why it's so important to keep pollutants like oil, trash, fertilizers, and yard waste out of storm drains. What goes in there flows directly into our shared environment.

During heavy storms, this system helps prevent flooding, but if it gets blocked or overwhelmed, water can pool in streets or basements.

Inflow and infiltration—when stormwater finds its way into the sanitary sewer system through cracks, sump pumps, or illegal connections—can overwhelm treatment plants and lead to increased costs for everyone. Meanwhile, cross-connections between the two systems can damage infrastructure and create environmental hazards.

As a community, we can help by:

- Avoiding connections between sump pumps or downspouts and the sanitary sewer.
- Keeping storm drains clear of debris.
- Properly disposing of oil, chemicals, fertilizers, and trash—not dumping them in the street.

By knowing the difference between these two essential systems and doing our part, we can protect public health, reduce costs, and preserve the environment, rain or shine! The CTA board meets the 2nd Tuesday of every month!

Let's Talk Storm Water!

In recent years, residents of Cumberland Township and greater Adams County have witnessed a noticeable shift in weather patterns—especially in the form of more intense and frequent rainstorms. As climate change accelerates, it brings with it new challenges for managing stormwater, particularly through our MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) program.

While stormwater might seem like a routine part of our infrastructure, the way we manage it is directly tied to flood prevention, water quality, and public safety. And as the climate changes, so must

our approach.

Over the past decade, Adams County has experienced several "100-year storms"—events that used to be rare, but are now occurring every few years. For example:

- July 2018: A sudden storm dropped over 6 inches of rain in just a few hours, flooding parts of Route 116 and causing washouts near Marsh Creek.
- September 2021 (remnants of Hurricane Ida): Brought flash flooding and overwhelmed stormwater infrastructure throughout Cumberland Township and Gettysburg Borough.
- Ongoing issues: Chronic ponding on local roads, eroded roadside ditches, and sediment buildup in creeks like Willoughby Run and Rock Creek.

These events stress our local MS4 systems, which were originally designed for older rainfall data that didn't anticipate such extreme precipitation.

Let's Talk Storm Water!

To address these challenges, Cumberland Township and neighboring municipalities are working on proactive solutions. Here's what's being done—and what more we can do:

1. Improved Infrastructure Projects

Recent culvert replacements and drainage improvements have increased capacity and reduced flooding risks during major storms. However, many older pipes and basins are undersized by today's standards.

2. Green Infrastructure Initiatives

Cumberland Township is encouraging the use of permeable surfaces in new developments and offering guidance to residents on how to reduce runoff with rain gardens, native plantings, and rain barrels.

Additionally, collaboration with the Adams County Conservation District has supported streambank stabilization projects that improve natural water flow and reduce erosion.

3. Updated Planning Tools

The township's engineers use updated rainfall data and climate models when reviewing development plans and stormwater permits. This ensures new systems are built to withstand the storms of today—not just those of the past.

4. Community Engagement

Through our stormwater education program, we're sharing best practices for homeowners to help manage runoff from their own properties—especially in neighborhoods near sensitive waterways like Rock Creek, Willoughby Run, Marsh Creek,



We all play a role in adapting to climate change. Here's how you can help:

- Use a rain barrel to capture and reuse stormwater from your roof
- Plant native vegetation to increase water absorption
- Avoid dumping anything into storm drains they lead directly to our creeks and streams
- Report stormwater concerns to the township so they can be addressed quickly

Climate change isn't a future threat—it's happening now. Cumberland Township remains committed to protecting our environment and infrastructure by modernizing our MS4 system and working collaboratively with residents and developers.

Together, we can build a more resilient community, protect our waterways, and prepare for whatever storms may come.


Participate in a Water Study through Penn State

The Water, Health, and Nutrition Laboratory at Pennsylvania State University is conducting a study on experiences and trust around water in Pennsylvania. The purpose of this study is to better understand how the social and physical environment affects how people perceive the safety of their water and the trust they have in their water supply, as well as how this affects different aspects of their life, like nutritional behaviors and health outcomes.

The study is asking questions about where people get their water, what affects the decision to use a specific water source, and how different environmental conditions affect experiences around water. The researchers are especially interested in people who use private water sources like private wells and roadside springs or those who live in Philadelphia.

The survey will take between 30 minutes and an hour to complete. Researchers will provide a \$25 Amazon gift card for those who choose to participate in this study. Information gained through this study could be used to improve education activities in the area.

You are eligible to participate in the study if you meet the following criteria: (1) your household uses municipal, well, or roadside springs for household water use and consumption; (2) you are over 18 years of age; (3) you are knowledgeable about your household's water situation; and (4) you are comfortable conversing in English. 162nd Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg

Gettysburg National Military Park will commemorate the 162nd anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg from Tuesday, July 1 through Thursday, July 3, 2025, with a series of special ranger-led programs, immersive battlefield walks, family activities, and evening presentations by renowned historians. All programs are free and open to the public.

"The anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg is a time for reflection, education, and connection," said Kristina Heister, Superintendent of Gettysburg National Military Park. "This year's schedule offers diverse opportunities for visitors of all ages to explore this pivotal moment in American history on the ground where it happened."

Featured Programs

Daily Ranger-Guided Walks and Talks will take place across the battlefield, including programs at Little Round Top, Devil's Den, the Gettysburg National Cemetery, and the fields of Pickett's Charge. These shorter programs highlight key events and decisions that helped shape the course of the Civil War.

Battle Walks—These intensive two-to-three-hour explorations of significant engagements will allow visitors to follow in the footsteps of Union and Confederate soldiers. Topics include the stand of Robinson's Division on Oak Ridge, the advance of the Irish Brigade through the Wheatfield, the desperate fighting at Culp's Hill, and more.

Family-Friendly Activities—Held each morning with hands-on history experiences and creative programs such as "Build It, Paint It, Mold It" invites children to recreate key sites using art materials while learning about the lives of 19th century civilians and soldiers.

Sacred Trust Talks—Held nightly at the Gettysburg National Military Park Museum and Visitor Center, feature expert historians as they share new perspectives on the battle's events and legacy. These programs are presented in partnership with the Gettysburg Foundation. Free tickets are required and can be reserved at: www.gettysburgfoundation.org.

Visitors are encouraged to dress for the weather, wear comfortable shoes, and bring plenty of water, especially when participating in battle walks. Program meeting locations vary; a full schedule and parking guidance can be found at www.nps.gov/gett.

162nd Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg A Local's Survival Guide

Each summer, Gettysburg comes alive with history as thousands of visitors flock to the area for the annual Battle of Gettysburg reenactment. This year marks the 162nd anniversary of the pivotal Civil War battle, and the reenactment promises to be one of the most riveting yet, featuring living history camps, cavalry demonstrations, battlefield scenarios, and educational exhibits. For locals, the event brings a unique opportunity to witness history in action—right in our own backyard.

While the reenactment is a treasured tradition, it also brings an influx of traffic and tourism. Residents are encouraged to plan ahead. Expect increased activity on local roads, especially around the Baltimore Pike, Emmitsburg Road, and in and around Gettysburg National Military Park. If you're heading into town, consider biking or walking when possible, or use alternate routes to avoid congestion. Parking may be limited, so allow extra time and check for temporary road closures or event detours on the County or Township websites.

Tips and Tricks to Make the Most of it

- Off the Beaten Path Check out restaurants on the outskirts of town or lesser-known monuments and trails.
- Stock Up Get your shopping done and tank filled before the influx of tourists begin to arrive.
- Make it Scenic Plan your detours in advance, and take the scenic route! We live in a beautiful place!
- Stay Informed Download Savvy Citizen to stay on top of traffic and weather for the area.

Main Areas to Avoid (or Approach with Caution)

- Baltimore Street & Steinwehr Ave These central arteries into town become heavily congested with pedestrian and bus traffic.
- Little Round Top, Devil's Den, and the High Water Mark These iconic sites usually have the largest crowds.
- Emmitsburg & Taneytown Roads These roads are major access points for most of the battlefield.
- Hanover Road The Daniel Lady farm is the site of the main reenactment, traffic will back up here, watch the hills.
- Lincoln Square Traffic is sure to be hosed, avoid unless you are walking through!

How Get Outdoors Works

There are fifteen "markers" - wooden posts with a unique etching attached - that are hidden in local and state parks in Adams County. Visit your local library to register for the **Get Outdoors** program, and you'll receive a guidebook, called a **Sketchbook**, and a rubbing sheet that you can use to record your discoveries. In the **Sketchbook**, you'll find directions to follow that will help you locate each marker.

When you find the marker, you'll see the etching with a 4-digit code. You can use your rubbing sheet and rub over the sheet with a crayon or pencil to reveal that marker's artwork and code, **but make sure you remember the 4-digit code** by taking a picture or writing it down. You can enter the code online using the Beanstack app to receive credit for that hike. See the Rewards and Prizes page in the Sketchbook or on the website to find out about entries for

the grand prize drawing and to receive a participation prize. All hikes must be recorded **no** later than Saturday, August 17 to receive a participation prize and earn entries into the grand prize drawing.
